Named to the American League All-Star Team his rookie season, Kittle is remembered for landing seven homers on the roof of the old Comiskey Park...a feat that still has Sox fans shaking their heads in amazement.

A native of Gary, Indiana, Ron played in the majors for 10 seasons before retiring due to a severe degenerative back injury.

Besides his glory days on the White Sox roster, Kittle also played with the New York Yankees, Cleveland Indians and Baltimore Orioles.
